
with deep-rooted joy that I get to be here to share the future with you.

On 7 October Bishop Rachel said to Archdeacon Hilary "I have Licensed Joy to the cure of souls in the Benefice of Thornbury and Oldbury, with Shepperdine. I now charge you to install her." At that point Revd Joy was taken up to the "stall" assigned to the priest of the parishes. The "stall" is way past the choir stalls and I don't expect that Revd Joy will be sitting up there often as she will enjoy being down in and among her congregation.

As the Covid-19 restrictions were in place for this service, only a small representative number of people were present including Organist Malcolm Kittle and a small Choir. Nevertheless the service had a wonderful atmosphere. The symbols of ministry were presented to Joy – a flagon of water for baptism, the oil of healing, a Bible, a prayer book, and a paten and chalice, in her response Joy asked for the whole Benefice congregation to join with her in sharing all these aspects of our Christian faith with the communities around us.

Bishop Rachel blessed Joy in her new ministry with those superb words from Numbers:

The Lord bless you and keep you.

The Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious to you.

The Lord lift up the light of his countenance upon you and give you peace.

Although this long-awaited service did not have all the people present that would normally be expected, and we could not have a giant party afterwards, we look forward to the Benefice moving forward under Joy's guidance and God's light.

Lesley will be greatly missed!

Clare Mary Fardell RIP

Clare originally came from Scotland – her father was City Assessor for Glasgow. After boarding school in North Wales, Clare became a student at St Andrew's University, where she met her future husband, Martin. Clare trained as a teacher, married Martin and they moved to Bristol where Catherine, Peter, John and Alice were born and Clare taught for many years at Westwing School, Kington.



As a member of the Liberal Democrats, Clare was elected to the Town Council in 1983 and served Thornbury as Mayor in 1987. She was also elected to Northavon District Council, later to become South Gloucestershire Council, standing down only at the most recent election. Clare remained on the Town Council until her fatal illness this summer.



Always aware of the needs of the elderly, Clare started the pensioners Tea Room in the Town Hall, and helped to open the Volunteer Centre also based at the Town Hall and served on the Committee for many years.

An effective School Governor both at the Castle School and Gillingstool, Clare was also a supporter of the Holiday Playscheme. A leader in the fight to save the Town Hall building, Clare was also involved with the Arts Festival—and a familiar face in

Oldbury where she and Martin attended and supported St Arilda's church.

Clare was known as a councillor who "got things done" and will always be remembered with appreciation. Our deepest sympathy is extended to Martin and the family.

It is hoped that there will be a memorial service where people can pay their respects at a later date.

A Look into the past

Might give Revd Joy Ideas ?!!

A friend of ours in London works in the records office at Kew. He came across this information:



Seeing that you have a new Vicar I thought you might be interested in the attached. It is the 1851 Ecclesiastical

Return for St Mary's Thornbury. These were completed by all religious establishments as part of the 1851 census and have recently been microfilmed by the National Archives.

This particular Return was completed by the then Vicar M F Townsend and compared to others is a little short on detail. However he did appear to have a large congregation to his morning and evening services on 30 March 1851.

The Vicar, Maurice F S Townsend was Irish, born in 1791 and a Widower. He lived in the Vicarage in Castle Street with his son Henry aged 23, daughters Geraldine aged 22, and Alice aged 19. All are reported as being born in Thornbury. Supporting them they had a Housekeeper, Cook, Ladies Maid, Servant and Footman. By comparison the Vicar in 1911, Alan Whitmore Cornwall had two Servants to support him and his wife and five children. Henry E McLeod the Vicar in 1939 had 2 Servants to support him and his four siblings. ***It begs the question as to how many support your new Vicar!!!***

I have a copy of the document from the census and it says an average of 500 were attending the services each week!

Term 1 has been a great success at St Mary's. Attendance of our children has been significantly above the national figure showing which reflects how well they have settled and are feeling secure back in school.

We have been doing a whole school project on Thornbury. Each class has taken an aspect and explored the theme. Topics have included, looking at the growth of Thornbury, places in and around Thornbury, water development in Thornbury, castles in the community, symbolism in the crest of Thornbury, study of the original families of Thornbury. The children have learnt what it is like to be historians.

A highlight of the term was the blessing of our new Remembrance Garden in the playground. This was done with Revd Tudor in an outdoor worship we had on the playground with the Year 6 class. During the service the children were also awarded their Bibles from the church.

I was also privileged to attend the licensing of Revd Joy. It was a lovely occasion and we are looking forward to many years of close links with the church.

We are also currently working on a new curriculum for the school which we hope to introduce in term 3. It is an exciting time for the school as we move forward with new staff and new ideas.

We miss regularly seeing our family, but on our walks we have had many socially distanced chats with people we have not seen for a while and made many new acquaintances as we have met others doing the same walks.

We have been saddened that so many of the surrounding fields are now covered with housing but we have been touched to see families enjoying new homes and their children playing together in the parklands and playgrounds provided. We hope that they will experience the same welcome we received when we moved to Thornbury so many years ago.



We are sad to see St. Paul's Church with notices saying there is restricted opening at the moment but experience joy in being able to see the beauty of God's creation all around us, especially in the hedgerows, the crops in the fields and the many animals, domestic and wild that have also become our friends.

News from your Churchwardens

Church Services

We look forward to our first service with Joy as Priest-in-Charge on Sunday 11 October. Joy and the Benefice Churchwardens are meeting on 17 October to discuss service in the future and over the Advent and Christmas season.

Goodbye

We said goodbye to Canon Tudor on Sunday 4 October. We recorded our grateful thanks to him for looking after us all for the last two months with a gift for Tudor and his wife – a voucher for his favourite restaurant, and we wish him well in his retirement.

In St Mary's

- The 5-year insurance inspection by Ecclesiastical Insurance took place on 14 September. Nothing serious was raised and we now await the official report. It is quite likely that we will have to have a roof alarm fitted.
- Some other long outstanding small paving works and repairs have been carried out inside the church by Centreline.
- We now have a date of 23 October for the fitting off the GEZE automatic door closers. However, this does not mean that the glass doors are arriving! It was decided that it was safest to carry out final measurements after the floor mounted door closers had been fitted. This seems to have been going on for years but we are getting there!
- Audio-Visual. We are now awaiting the Faculty from the Chancellor. He has raised some additional questions to which we have responded. We are discussing with Noiseboys what is required to add the ability to live stream services.
- The clock is now with Cumbria Clocks. It is hoped to have this back very soon.
- We are expecting Jack Hainsworth's memorial bench and the new external Notice board at St Mary's sometime this month.
- A new incumbents list is now up in church and looking lovely. Thank you to Fiona Mitchell.
- We have now started to obtain quotes for the required work to the stained-glass windows.

St Paul's

- The 5-year insurance inspection by Ecclesiastical was carried out on 14 September. Nothing major arose. Some minor tidying up of materials (now done) and some tree pruning is required.
- A quotation for a new notice board is being obtained.



Church Hall in times of Covid

The church hall committee found out that you can only keep people locked down for so long. Back in June and July some of the church hall users were wanting to restart their regular meeting in the church hall.

However before you can return to normality it is necessary

to be aware that the hall must operate within the covid government guide lines by offering a clean and safe place in which to meet. In addition to the environment we needed to be aware of additional risks that covid brings. We prepared a Risk Assessment for the hall to cover the use of the hall within government regulations. From a safety point of view we needed to ask all groups to produce a Risk Assessment appropriate to their groups use within the hall risk assessment.

We concluded that as the hall had not been used for four months we could thoroughly clean the hall during August in readiness to welcome groups back in September when schools re-opened.


We needed signage to remind people to keep two meters apart, to limit the number of people in the toilets at any one time, to clean all touch points and surfaces used when they have finished. So we had to have a sanitizer at the entrance and sanitizers in the toilets, baby changing room and the kitchen.

We provided disinfectant, sanitizer, wipes and gloves to enable them to leave the hall safe after use.

All groups need to record everyone who attended the hall at each event. This can be by using either a QR code (can be scanned using the NHS application on a smart phone) or return to pencil and paper to take down details.

The hall welcomed its first group on the 9th September and by the end of October we will have two art groups once a week, Music with Mummy meet twice a week, Kumon education group meet twice a week, two separate play groups meet once a month, JIGSAW (who hire toys out to families with children who have disabilities) meet once a month, Thornbury Magazine meet once a month. Babies and Toddlers, Guides/Brownies and Rainbows, six U3A groups are making plans to restart as soon as possible. There are three more groups planning to restart in January 2021.

All this assuming Covid does not put a spanner in the works!

Restricted Service Dates for November-December 2020


Sunday mornings 10.00 am Benefice Eucharist at St Mary's
